Here is a little something to consider as we await His coming;

Matthew 2: 11. "On coming to the house, they saw the child with His mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped Him."

Many of us, when we were young heard our parents say, "sit up", "don't slouch", and even, "stand up straight." I even remember placing a book on my head to more "properly" learn to stand and walk.

Standing straight and tall has always been a sign of confidence, control, and strength. To sit or stand casually was in many minds a sign of inattention, boredom, and weakness. Even corporations have studied and taught the effects of body language and how it can affect business in the marketplace.

Yet our verse today tells us that wise men of great importance, who came from a distant land, bowed in submission and worshipped a tiny baby. Think of this moment in time. Wise men, who in their hometown would have been respected and bowed to, brought gifts, and submitted themselves to a lowly child.

This reminds me of an incident in the dead of winter that made headlines some years back. A photographer snapped a picture of a New York policeman who purchased shoes and socks and then bowed down and put them on a homeless man. He humbled himself, gave gifts, and showed respect to a fellow human being.

So, the question to ask ourselves is, what posture will we show this Christmas season? Pride and strength or humbly bowing to Jesus and caring for our neighbor? I say, we should choose the "Wise" way.
