Speaking of reading devotionals... there are a few that I read daily to help me on my life's journey. A recent one that I read really took me back. First to my childhood and then back to the present, helping me to understand more clearly how God works. I hope my thoughts on this message will help you as it did me.

As a child I was taught to "mind my elders." In other words, grown-ups were wise, and they knew all about life, its twists and turns, and always knew what needed to be done in any situation. I had a pretty safe childhood and always respected "my elders." In fact, I couldn't wait until the day came when I would become a wise grown up and would then be able to "know what to do, and how to act, in all of life's situations."

Well, that big day came many years ago. But do you know what I discovered? That even being a "grown-up," I still don't have all the answers. And there are still many times that I just don't know what to

do. (Were my parent's lives actually like this? Yep!!) I discovered that whether there are problems with health, finances, anger, family disputes, you name it, there are times that I just want to close my eyes and cry out, "Lord help me. I just don't know what to do." Am I the only one who has felt this way? I'll let you answer that one yourselves.

If we look in the book of 2 Corinthians, we will see that even the Apostle Paul had the same feelings of helplessness. If you recall, he spoke of a "thorn" in his life that caused him much frustration and pain. He even prayed many times that God would remove this thorn. However, it was through this thorn, which many think was a physical ailment, that he experienced the love of God. This "thorn," allowed Paul to endure and overcome his difficulties. He learned that his personal weaknesses and helplessness didn't mean defeat. He wrote, that when he surrendered and placed his trust in God, the weaknesses that he had, became the very tools that allowed him to work through life's circumstances. 2 Cor.12: 9-10. (my paraphrase)

Let's face it, as we grow, we do become wiser, but no one will ever have all the answers. So, like Paul, we need to realize that we are all to some degree, powerless. And the true power is in Christ; "For when I am weak, then I am strong." Verse 10.

What I am learning is, that "growing up" means that our weakness is what allows us to trust the power that comes from God, when we are in need of His loving and unending help.
