From your Pastor

Dear Members and Friends,

In ancient Rome, when you needed to write something down, you used a tabula. A tabula, or tablet, was a slate that was covered with wax. You then wrote in the wax what you wanted to record or remember by using a thin stick or feather quill. Sounds good so far. But what happens when your tabula slate becomes full? (yes, this is where we get our saying, “I have a full slate”) All you needed to do was heat your tabula slate, melt the wax, let it cool, and when it hardened, you guessed it, you had “a clean slate”. By the way, this procedure was known as tabula rasa, which means to erase. (Don’t you just love it?)

Before you begin to think that I’ve lost my mind, consider this; when we are born, we are all born with a clean slate. As we grow, our slates can become filled with so many of the world’s ideas and images that by the time we are old enough to believe in Christ and follow Him, our slates are often already filled. But Paul addresses this problem in his letter to the church in Rome. Romans 12 verse 2 says, “Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God’s will is - His good, pleasing, and perfect will”. Hmm. “The renewing of your mind.” In other words, “tabula rasa”, erase and start anew. We are to fill our minds, our inner tabula, with God’s truth, the living truth that is found on the pages of The Bible. And as you read and study, allow His words to “melt” your heart and give you “a clean slate”, so that you will be renewed as you grow in Christ.

Lent is the perfect time to inspect and unclutter your tabula. To renew your mind, to pray, to repent, to search, and discover what God has written on your heart.

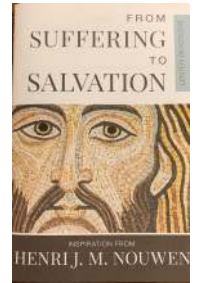
Storage Building

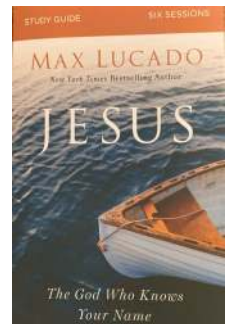
LENT DEVOTIONAL
